Who Is Your Child's Best Teacher?

Christian Education in Focus — September

Which teacher has influenced your child the most? His teacher at school? The Sunday school teacher who has him every Sunday? The scoutmaster who took him camping? The answer may surprise you. None of these!

Your child's best teacher from the beginning to the end is *you*. Think about it! From earliest childhood *you* have taught him — to walk, to talk, to eat, to drink. *You* taught him safety and manners. *You* told him about Santa Claus and the Easter rabbit. While the outside teachers have guided him for a few hours at a time, *you* have had him every day of his life. Yes, *you* will continue to teach him as he grows by your actions and your words.

All through his growing years he will follow your actions. He will copy the things he has seen you do. He will follow your habits, ideas, and ways. Later on he will try to become independent and think for himself. But he will never root out the things

you have taught him. What you teach him now is for life, good or bad, for better or worse.

Teachers of Religion Too?

One area of teaching gives us parents a special responsibility — the area of religious training. Here *we* are truly our children's best teachers. We are no longer alone in what we think and do about religion.

Like everything else, the parent's habits become the child's habits. Church attendance, Lord's Supper attendance, saying prayers before and after meals, Bible reading at home, practicing living as Jesus' people every day, and supporting the church with money and time are good habits children will learn from us.

Many parents fool themselves by thinking this is not so. Today's modern children are not fooled, even as we were not fooled when we saw our own parents say one thing and do another.

Time for Action

Now is the time to decide what you want to teach your children,

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right? You can give them no greater gift than a faith for the rest of their lives. You can give them no better start in life than introducing them to Jesus. You can give them no finer skill than an ability to speak to God in prayer. You can give them no finer guide to morals and behavior than the example of a

truly Christian life.

All of these things are in your power to teach your child. *No other teacher can do it!* If you do not teach him these things, he may never learn them.

Today is a good time to start! Right now!

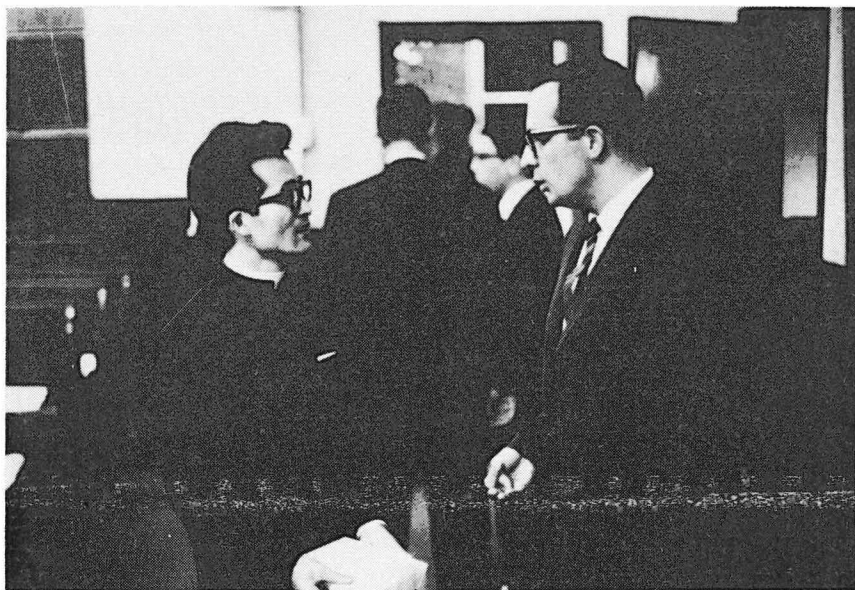
The Lutheran Church in Japan Accepts the Challenge

Japan is sometimes called the "Land of the Rising Sun." The rising sun brings the light of day and, traveling through the countryside, I could see the beauty of the land. The man traveling with me was Japanese. This was his land, and he was called by the church to serve the deaf people of this land. I thought as we traveled, what good is this land with all its beauty if it does not also become the land of the "Risen Son."

The Lutheran churches in Japan are very concerned that the

country does become the land of the Risen Son of God and that the people of the land, hearing as well as deaf, know Him as Savior.

Recently the Japan Evangelical Lutheran Church and the Nihon Lutheran Church (Missouri Synod) agreed to carry on a joint program for bringing Christ to the deaf of Japan. In June a joint committee of the two churches was appointed to study carefully the needs of the deaf and to find out what the churches are doing to meet these needs. Once the committee sees what needs to be

done, it can set goals and make plans for the future. Study and planning must come before action.

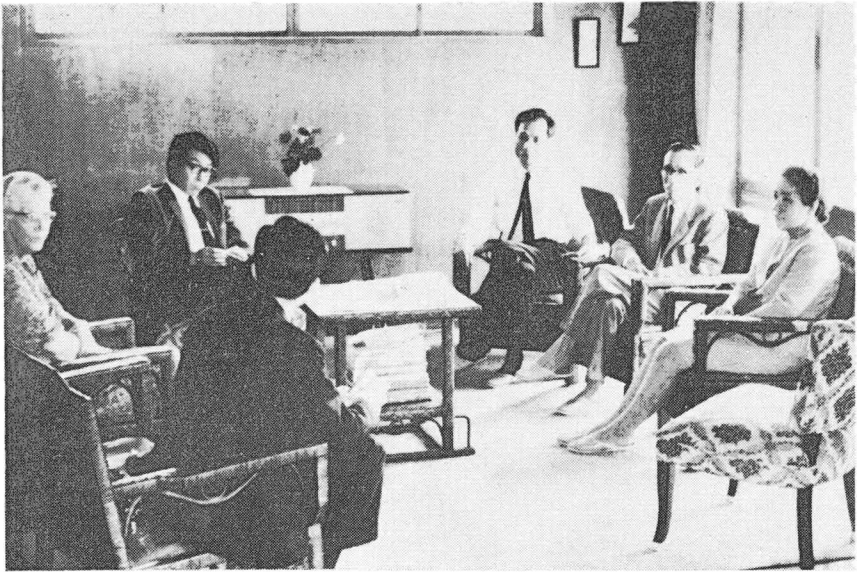
A second task of the joint committee will be communication. If this work among the deaf of Japan is to be the work of the church, then each congregation of the church should know about the work. Each congregation should be interested, concerned, and involved in the work. Therefore, communication is important. Each month we hope to see articles in the church's newspapers and magazines about the deaf and about the church's program for the deaf.

Finally, the committee is re-

sponsible for preparation. Congregations working with the deaf need workers. The workers may be pastors or laymen, but they need training. Therefore, the church needs people who are able to train workers. All this is preparation, just getting ready to do the work of introducing the deaf to the Risen Son of God.

The beginning may seem slow. The numbers may not seem very large or impressive, but the church is concerned (1) that all people receive the Gospel and (2) that every dollar given to the Lord is used wisely and carefully to do the best possible job.

Our many vacancies led to a decrease in the number of church services held and a corresponding drop in attendance last year. We do note a slight increase in our gifts to God for His work and a larger share of our gifts for world missions and welfare. May we continue to respond to God in faith and worship as we manage the blessings He gives us, and let us show Him our thanks and gratitude by continuing to set aside part of those blessings for His work.

Continue to remember your church in your prayers. Pray for our missionaries and pastors as they travel great distances to serve the needs of the deaf. Pray God's blessings upon our congregations' officers, who accept responsibility to lead our deaf churches. Pray for each other, as we eagerly live as Christians and serve the Lord with our time, abilities, and all that we have.

the Spring 1968 issue of *Family Safety*, a publication of the National Safety Council, which praised the deaf driver and supported NAD's contention that hearing is no asset when it comes to driving. The article noted that hearing is often a liability, because people rely on it even though they can hear little of what is happening outside their car.

The NAD is seeking permission to reprint this article in the near future. If any deaf have difficulty in securing auto insurance at reasonable rates, they are encouraged to contact the NAD offices for copies of pamphlets pertaining to deaf drivers. The deaf have been using their chapel since November 1966, but



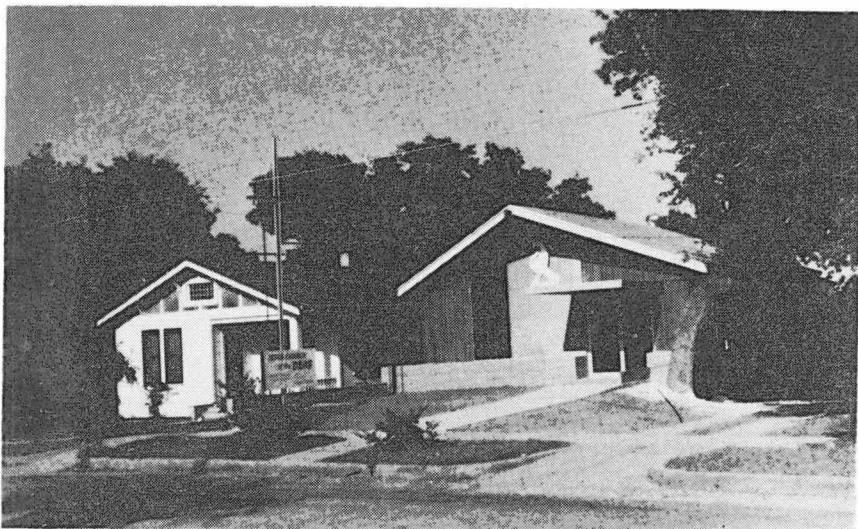
the hearing congregation's new sanctuary will not be finished until this fall.
